## JMS students celebrate groundbreaking of new school

A groundbreaking ceremony was held Tuesday, June 7 near the site of the replacement Jemtegaard Middle School and new Columbia River Gorge Elementary School with the entire JMS student body in attendance.

With the backdrop of several pieces of large equipment which had recently begun site work, WSD Superintendent Dr. Mike Stromme pointed out to students that clearly this was a ceremonial event. "Groundbreakings are important to commemorate milestones such as the building of these two new schools," he said. "For those of you who stay and raise families in Washougal, you may have children who attend these schools and can say that you were here for this special occasion."

Among those wielding shovels at the event was Alma Jemtegaard Ladd, niece of the middle school namesake, Gudrun Jemtegaard. "She was an excellent teacher and taught in Washougal for 42 years," Ladd told the group of students. "Because she was here so long she actually taught three generations of Washougal families." Ladd said her aunt was beloved by the whole community often buying shoes and school lunch for those students in need. The naming of the school in her honor in 1981 was the highlight of Jemtegaard's life, according to Ladd.

Construction will hit high gear this summer and plans are for doors to open to students in Fall of 2017. Groundbreaking ceremonies were held May 10 for the new Excelsior School and WSD Transportation Facilities. Work will begin on those facilities over the summer as well.

The new facilities and safety improvements to all schools is made possible by the voter-approved capital bond in February 2015. Look for construction progress on the WSD website at http://www.washougal.k12.wa.us/

## Results of water testing show Washougal schools lead-free

This spring, the Washougal School District conducted testing of the school drinking water in all schools. In every case, the lead test results showed the water was safe based on the limits established by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). In fact, testing revealed non-detectable levels of lead at all Washougal schools with the exception of Excelsiorl, which had a result of

one-tenth of the permissible level. According to the Washington State Department of Health, the maximum allowable limit is .015 parts per million.

Cape Horn-Skye Elementary and Canyon Creek Middle schools use water provided from a well. Both schools were tested in September 2015 for lead and copper with results well within permissible levels.

#### Washougal welcomes new Special Education director

Rebecca Von Duering joins WSD as Special Education Director for the Washougal School District. Dr. Von Duering will assume her new role on July 1, 2016.

#### New program helps ease transition to middle school

The transition to middle school can be a scary one for elementary students who don't know what to expect. That's why Washougal teachers came up with a plan to make the transition seem less intimidating. During the month of February, fifth graders from Hathaway spent an entire school day visiting Jemtegaard, shadowing a middle school mentor and experiencing a typical day in middle school. This is a change from past years where fifth grade students may have visited for just a few hours out of a day.



Having students visit earlier in the year and shadow a middle school student for the entire day allows students to get a real sense of what middle school is like, including finding their way around, having lunch, and going from class to class.

Sixth grader Adamaris Castro-Coca chose to participate and support incoming fifth graders because she didn't have the opportunity when she entered middle school last year. "I wanted to do it for other people," she said. "It can be scary if you don't know where your classes are. Middle school shouldn't be scary, it should be fun."

Hathaway Elementary was named a 2015 Washington Achievement Award winner in the category of Overall Excellence.

The Washington Achievement Award is sponsored by the Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction (OSPI) and the State

#### RETIREMENT PLANS:


