Bus drivers help connect students to learning resources

Washougal school bus driver, Dana Morris, rides in the front row of Bus 57 with Nancy McGuire in the driver's seat for a typical Monday route. The bus moves along with eerie silence and empty seats, its only cargo is a box of manila envelopes and orange bags of educational materials for delivery. The role of Washougal school buses and their drivers may have changed dramatically since the school closure in mid-March, but their main function, to connect students with their education, remains the same.

Although many teachers and students can use online resources to connect and provide instruction and learning, this does not work for all families or lessons. "We have some families that do not have access to Wi-Fi, and during the Stay at Home order are not able to drive to find a connection," said Les Brown, Director of Communication and Technology. "We are working to meet the varying needs of all our students and making sure that Internet access is not a barrier to student participation. The district is also providing drive-up Wi-Fi at school sites, exploring service at meal distribution sites, and procuring hotspots to serve families who have no other options."

The buses are also being used to deliver boxed meals. Prepared and assembled by food service employees, boxes include an entire week's worth of food supplies. Approximately 6,000 meals each week are being delivered since the program started in early April.

Often, items are sent in both directions. As families and students collect information sent from their teachers, they bring completed work and even library books to be returned to the schools and teachers. Online check out of school library books began in early April and more and more families are using the service.

"The kids really love that we are out here making deliveries in our buses and they love getting the chance to see us," Morris said. "I think they miss the continuity of if all. Going out to meet the bus feels a little like the way things used to be for them."





Ron Dinius will be stepping away from the Washougal School Board District #5 position after nearly 15 years of distinguished service.



Gause Green Team creates healthier school environment

Gause Elementary is now certified as Silver in the Washington Green School program which works to create greener, healthier school environments. To reach silver distinction, schools had to be certified in two areas of conservation. For Gause, those areas are water and waste reduction.

The Gause Green Team is made up of 4th and 5th graders. Last year's project was focused on waste reduction, installing milk dispensers to reduce the amount of solid waste from milk cartons. Their latest project was to educate their peers about keeping contamination from going down storm drains.

The Gause Green Team's recent project was inspired by the new school parking lot, as well as the Steigerwald Floodplain Restoration Project. "We learned about what happens to water, and other things, that go down storm drains and how they could adversely affect wildlife, including salmon," explained Ellen Lancaster, Green Team Advisor and Gause custodian. "I shared with students some very interesting information on the importance of the Pacific Lamprey, an anadromous parasitic lamprey in our waters, and how what seems like just a little bit of contamination in a storm drain can add up to a big impact when you consider how many drains we have."

Just before the school closures on March 10, the Gause team was able to attend the Student Summit at Clark College and share what

they had learned. "We presented our project and learned about other areas of environmental concern," Lancaster said. "Activities included measuring air quality around the college campus and learning about how compost happens by going through compost looking for decomposers."
