Panthers' Café serves up great coffee and opportunity

A new breakfast bistro called Panthers' Café opened to staff and students in March at Washougal High School. Panthers' Café is the latest creative Worksite Learning program that offers students direct experience with running a coffee shop/café while earning high school and college credits.

Bringing the bistro to fruition was a team effort involving many local business owners and school staff. These adult mentors have ensured that every part of the planning, launch, and operations of the café has been a learning experience for students. In addition to learning how to safely and skillfully operate an espresso machine and cook waffles, the high school students have learned about the necessary paperwork involved in running a small business and the regulations and challenges that come with operating under the guidelines of the federal nutrition program.

"The students involved are very excited," said Director of CTE and Culinary Services, Margaret Rice. "They've helped to develop what this looks like and what it entails." She added, "Our students will leave this experience well trained. They will be ready to be

hired at any of our local coffee shops, cafes, or restaurants. Their skills will transfer to many other job opportunities as well, and we are thrilled to help them get their start."

Washougal High School's CTE (Career

& Technical Education) programs provide students opportunities to solve real-world problems, gain valuable on-the-job skills, and receive a robust educational experience. There are about 1,200 middle and high school students currently enrolled in a CTE program or class at Washougal.

In addition to earning college credits and gaining real-world experience, the CTE program offers students many other benefits. A recent study from the non-profit Student Research Foundation found that CTE programs attract a broad cross-section of high school students. It also found that most students have at least a "B" average, and the overwhelming majority plan to continue their education immediately following graduation.

The student-operated Panthers' Café is open to students and staff every morning in the Excelsior building of Washougal High School.







Middle school students help reduce district facilities costs

Washougal School District is working with students to implement a collaborative and cost-saving health and safety measure. It all started when Facilities, Maintenance, and Grounds Supervisor Jessica Beehner received a request to install some sort of acrylic mat or drip tray under wall-mounted hand sanitizers in schools. The problem was that hand sanitizer was dripping when people used the machines and potentially causing a hazard or damage. Beehner identified the project as a possible student opportunity and contacted Washougal's Director of Career and Technical Education (CTE) Margaret Rice. She explained the need for some sort of catch basin and asked if there were students who could benefit from this kind of hands-on project. Rice said the Canyon Creek Middle School after-school Design and Modeling Club was a perfect match.

Rice pitched the idea to Greg Lewis, who teaches Design & Modeling at both Jemtegaard and Canyon Creek Middle School. He also serves as the Design and Modeling Club Advisor at Canyon Creek Middle School. Lewis and the students immediately got to work doing research and designing a prototype out of cardboard. At first, the group approached the project by splitting into teams but later came together to design the prototype. "It was a collaborative effort in coming up with the design and dimensions," Lewis said. "The students seemed to really enjoy both making a prototype out of cardboard to get the dimensions that we thought would work, and then creating it in Tinkercad." Utilizing the Tinkercad software and a 3-D printer, the students watched their work evolve from design concept to final product. The sanitizer catch basins will be installed in all the schools, and the Design and Modeling students will get to see their product in use.

"This project solves a safety problem, saves the district money, and provides students the opportunity for hands-on learning to

solve a real-world problem," said Rice. "Facilities staff can work with the students to customize the basin, which they can't do with the 'off-the-shelf' products out there for sale." Throughout the development process, students also learned more about facilities, maintenance, and grounds work at the district, giving them insight into a potential career path.

"These types of projects are always welcome," said Rice. "Authentic learning is so much more fun and engaging for students."

Both Canyon Creek and Jemtegaard Middle School have a Design and Modeling club that meets after school, paving the way for future collaborative efforts and problem-solving. The clubs are instrumental in providing middle school students opportunities to learn how to design and create solutions to problems, just as they did with the catch basin project. Students communicate design ideas through sketches or prototypes, work collaboratively to identify design requirements, research topics, and engage stakeholders in solutions—all valuable skills for future careers.

The annual STRIDE fun run is set for Saturday, May 21!

AGE 4: NO-COST TRANSITIONAL KINDERGARTEN

Eligibility requirements for enrollment (must meet all):

- Turn four years old by Aug. 31 (students who are five years old on August 31 will enroll in Kindergarten)
- Reside within the Washougal School District boundary
- Not be otherwise identified for participation in Head Start and/or ECEAP preschool programs

Additional qualifying criteria for TK enrollment (must meet at least one):

- Experience lack of access (financial, availability, or other significant factor) to a licensed preschool opportunity
- Qualify for free/reduced meals
- Qualify for bilingual education
- Exhibit underdeveloped social and/ or academic skills based on a WSD administered screening

AGE 5: DUAL LANGUAGE LEARNING AT HATHAWAY

Students and families enrolling for Kindergarten in the 2022-23 school year have an exciting opportunity to join the second cohort of our new Dual Language program at Hathaway Elementary School. The Dual Language program promotes high levels of academic achievement for students while enabling them to become fluent in both English and Spanish.

The Dual Language program is focused on language learning, academics, and cultural diversity, and is taught 90% in Spanish, and 10% in English. The immersion model works best with young learners who are primed for learning a new language, and is guided by research that shows a number of positive outcomes for participants.

Families of students who enroll in programs similar to Washougal's Dual Language program see higher academic achievement in both languages, and learners who are more engaged in the curriculum and have a greater appreciation for cultural diversity and respect. Research shows that students in dual language programs are happier, more motivated, and more likely to graduate than their peers.

Dual Language is housed at Hathaway Elementary School. Students participating in this program receive instruction in art, music, P.E., and reading, along with their dual language Kindergarten curriculum. Dual Language is supported by the voter-approved 2020 Washougal Educational Programs and Operations
