"The students came with all levels of experience and gained skills working as a team on a real construction project," said Ron Schumacher, Fire Marshal at the Camas-Washougal Fire Department.

SCHOOL BOARD CORNER

The school board will be focusing on two pillars of the WSD Strategic Plan 2025 during this school year. The board identified Effective Instruction and Stewardship of Resources as areas to focus on this year.

The board chose Effective Instruction as a goal to continue the progress teachers and students have made over the last year, as measured by the Smarter Balanced Assessment. During the Ends Report presentation, the board reviewed assessment outcomes from our schools, which include the district making gains in most areas. Year-to-year district assessment scores improved in 70% of grade and subject areas measured by the Smarter Balanced Assessment.

The board chose Stewardship of Resources to focus on aligning our staffing with student enrollment and bringing expenditures in line with the revenue available. Community members will be invited to participate in this process through a survey later this winter that gathers priorities as we work with district leadership to develop the budget.

The school board is continuing the Listening Tours that began last spring. The Listening Tours are an opportunity to talk with a board member, ask questions, and share ideas about our schools. The board valued the conversations with the community, and received valuable feedback about our schools and programs. The next listening tour is on February 13, 2024 from 3-4:30 PM at the Excelsior building, 1401 39th Street in Washougal. Visit our website for a full list of dates, times, and locations.

Budget Corner: State funding leaves gap

Over the last seven years, our enrollment has decreased by 13.6%. Washougal experienced a significant growth in enrollment when families moved into the Sunset Ridge neighborhood in the early 2000s. As the last of that large wave of students graduates, our enrollment is projected to decline over the next four to five years.

Declining enrollment reduces state AND levy funding

As we serve fewer students, we receive less funding from the state, leaving a gap in teacher salaries that local funds must support. However, local levy funds are capped based on the number of students enrolled, and the decline in enrollment means that we will not be allowed to collect all of the levy funds voters approved in April of 2023.


In addition, the state only provides \$79,944 for a teacher but we spend \$100,850 on average. This is a \$20,906 gap between what we receive and what we spend to ensure a high quality education for every student.

Less funding will require staffing and program changes

District leadership have made adjustments to staffing this fall to help address the funding gap caused by declining enrollment, but there will be additional changes needed for the next school year as well.

Supplementing with levy funds

Levies are crucial to supplementing our state funding through an election every three to four years. Thank you voters for approving levy funds which keep class sizes small, fund after school activiites, and make things like student competitions and performances possible.



We welcome your budget feedback!

December: The Governor proposes a new state budget for school funding. This is also when the school distirct begins our budget process with the school board for the next school year. Over the course of the year, we gather enrollment forecasts and staffing and spending needs which impact our budget decisions.

February: We gather community input through a survey on the budget based on the enrollment forecast. We want to hear from you during this process!


