Shoug Shack serves up fresh meals, hands-on learning

On February 16, students at Washougal High School served up their first meals out of the Shoug Shack, the high school's new student-run food truck. The Shoug Shack is a student-run project, from conceptualization of the food truck to menu development, meal preparation, customer service, and more.

"I'm learning a lot about business, and how much effort and planning goes into running a small business," said Drake Leifsen, student in Advanced Culinary Arts at Washougal High School.

Despite budgetary constraints, the district has been able to maintain important job readiness programs like the food truck project by leveraging strong local community support and targeted funding sources like state CTE funding, grants, and community partnerships.





Budget Corner: Responding to a \$3M budget shortfall for 2024-25

Like other school districts across the state, Washougal is facing a budget shortfall. In our district, we have a projected budget shortfall of \$3 million for the 2024-2025 school year. Our budget challenges are caused by several factors which include the state underfunding education, inflation, declining enrollment, and a levy rollback required for next year.

In response to the projected budget shortfall, district leadership began making reductions in this year's spending, including reducing school budgets, implementing a hiring freeze, and salary concessions by administrative staff.

Community input guides planned reductions


District leadership gathered feedback from our community through:

- two Board Listening Tours
- four Superintendent Roundtable events
- a community survey that gathered 750 responses from students and their families, our staff, and the community

The survey results include themes around reducing more from administrative and district office expenses, and asking the district to consider program reductions, office consolidations, and maintaining student programs.

District leadership used the feedback to guide development of a planned reduction that has the greatest percentage of reductions in administrative pay, support, and staff, and maintains excellent programs for our students.
